
I end by saying that as a year ends another begins and we look forward to working with you all in the coming year. Wishing you all a very merry Christmas and prosperous new year!

Hello my name is **Ester Jamera**, and I am Senior Project Nurse for Staff Experience at Leeds Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust. I am also the founder and former co-chair of the Trust's BME Staff Network. It has been such a privilege to know, collaborate and receive the support of Paulette and Maurina.

Paulette and Maurina have been longstanding links for Leeds Teaching Hospitals through their CNMA project which offers pastoral care for international nurses of Caribbean decent. Over the years, they have been instrumental in bringing to our attention numerous issues including the financial challenges faced by Internationally Recruited Nurses (IRN) who require Maternity Leave within their first 12 months of moving to the UK as they did not qualify for NHS maternity pay.

We worked closely with our HR team to address this and offer affected IRNs retrospective maternity support. I am encouraged to see that NHSE/I have since provided guidance on Maternity for internationally recruited staff.

Following their guest appearance at the Trust BME Staff Network meeting where they shared lessons learnt from their project, they were promptly invited back to share their presentation with our Matrons. It became clear that a shared desire to improve the experience of IRNs and equip managers with the knowledge and confidence they need to affect change forms the foundation of our collaborative work.

Paulette and Maurina have also supported us in welcoming a team of Saint Vincent and the Grenadines nurses who are currently undertaking a clinical observership placement in the Trust. We can safely say Paulette and Maurina are part of the LTHT family and are thankful for their love and support. It was a wonderful surprise to meet Paulette at the recent Nursing Times Workforce awards in London on **Tuesday 22 November 2022** and celebrate my Diversity and Inclusion Champion of the Year award.

I always carry myself professionally and I always give the best care I can to all my patients. I worked on the surgical and medical unit before I was transferred to the Oncology and Hematology Unit. 
WEDNESDAY 9 FEBRUARY 2022

A Taste of Christmas Flavour was organised by Marlene, Juliann and Crystal. It was very enjoyable, well attended with talented local and international participants.


